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

The Columbus arts community had much to be proud of in 2021; despite continued uncertainty surrounding the pandemic, continued social unrest, ongoing financial hardship and staffing issues. At the same time, while we know our community, our country and the world still has a long way to go on our road to recovery, we want to take this opportunity to celebrate what we accomplished together in 2021 and to share our optimism for 2022.

We continue to be grateful for the stalwart support the Franklin County Commissioners and the city of Columbus provided us throughout this challenging time. In 2021, the county's financial support was essential to our accomplishments. Last year also saw the reemergence of our city funding sources—the bed tax and ticket fees. While these city funds are not back to pre-pandemic levels, the gradual return of events and travel ensured that we were still able to reinvest back into the community at historic levels. In addition, Arts Council reserves accrued over the previous eight years as well as continued pandemic support, provided through PPP loans, helped make these unprecedented funding levels possible.

The following highlights are some of the ways in which we continued to build resiliency in the face of changes brought by the pandemic while also working to prepare the cultural sector for recovery and sustainability:

- >> Our 25 Operating Support grants increased nine percent over 2020 levels to \$6,116,917. The total grants awarded in Project Support grants increased significantly in 2021 to 55 grants totaling \$722,372, a 32 percent increase in dollars awarded.
- >> The Art Unites Cbus effort which began after the deaths of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, and others at the hands of police in 2020, continued in 2021. The protest murals were exhibited at six locations in the community and the work of the #ArtUnitesCbus Film & Photography grant recipients was displayed in The Loann Crane Gallery at the Arts Council.
- The Deliver Black Dreams partnership with Maroon Arts Group and the city of Columbus continued with the installation of two new large-scale murals, one on the south side and one in the Hilltop.
- >> In partnership with the Columbus Museum of Art, the Arts Council hosted our first Aminah Brenda Lynn Robinson artist-in-residence, Memphis-based artist Johnathan Payne. We also awarded our second and third Aminah Fellowships to Columbus-based artists Wendy Kendrick and Richard Duarte Brown, respectively.
- >> We leveraged the Columbus Makes Art campaign to launch the Columbus Makes Art Passport, which encouraged Columbus residents to jump back into exploring our city's amazing arts

experiences. Fifty-nine organizations participated and 10,000 Passports were distributed free to the public. It was a resounding success.

- >>> The Arts Council helped coordinate the national launch of Wil Haygood's new book, *Colorization: One Hundred Years of Black Film in a White World.* Twelve different organizations participated in the launch with 10 public events that helped reveal Wil's wit and wisdom to a broader cross section of Columbus' population, and which helped kickoff Wil's 25-city nationwide tour.
- >>> GCAC presented our first two \$20,000 Artists Elevated awards to Erika Tay Lane, a theater director, writer, and actor and to Quianna Simpson, a dancer and choreographer. Thanks to a \$1 million gift from the American Electric Power Foundation, Bath & Body Works, and many generous individual donors, the GCAC Community Fund endowment that supports these awards grew significantly in 2021.
- >> The board and staff continued to put our inclusion, diversity, equity and accessibility efforts at the forefront of our work, infusing it across all administration and program areas and engaging in ongoing training to propel our work. You'll see this work reflected throughout this report, including ensuring that representation on our board of trustees reflects the demographics of Franklin County (see pie chart, page 6).

Through it all, our vision of a thriving community where the arts matter to all of us remains our driving force—guiding our commitment to support and advance the arts and cultural fabric of Columbus every day.

As always, we are grateful to the city of Columbus, Franklin County Commissioners, the Ohio Arts Council and all the individuals, businesses, and community partners who support arts and culture in our region.



Grants & Services

Each year the Greater Columbus Arts Council's Grants & Services team strives to serve artists and organizations with the best possible resources and assistance. In 2021, Grants & Services focused on broadening and deepening services to artists, providing a variety of workshops useful to individuals and organizations, and conducting research to help establish base-line data and improve future services to the community.

- A new grants associate was hired with a specific focus on serving and connecting with artists—particularly with younger artists and artists of color.
- >> The OPPArt e-newsletter was re-imagined to be more visual, engaging and to connect to more resources.
- Virtual workshops on a variety of topics were conducted and recordings of the sessions were posted on the Arts Council's YouTube channel.
- >> In-person services were provided on a regular basis in the Arts Council's new computer lab to artists without access to and limited knowledge of technology.
- New in 2021, GCAC reimbursed six Project Support grantees for new Quickbooks purchases or Quickbooks software upgrades purchased through Tech Soup, a technology service organization providing deep discounts to nonprofits.
- >> For the first time demographic information was collected as part of all grant applications. We view data collection as an essential tool in our commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion and access. The data collected will serve multiple purposes: to help us understand how we reflect the communities we serve, to utilize data to better serve the needs of our artistic community, and to track our progress in these efforts.



Community funding is the amount of money the Arts Council provides to organizations and projects in the community and includes: Grants & Services, Designated Project Support, Deliver Black Dreams/Arts Unites Cbus, and Film Columbus expenses (see Financials on page 40 for breakdown). The Arts Council is required to direct at least 75% of city revenues and 95% of county revenues to community funding expenses. Community funding continued to grow during the pandemic due to proceeds from the admissions fee, CARES Act funds, increased funding from Franklin County and board designation of unrestricted funds. During the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020, the Arts Council directed 100% of County funds to community funding expenses and the board of trustees approved unrestricted funds to be used for grants in the amount of \$200,000 for each year.

THRIVE

The Arts Council continued the Thrive program in 2021 with three new award recipients: Thiossane Institute, Two Scoops National Performance Art Company and Urban Strings Columbus. This multi-year grant program is designed to support organizations led by and serving people of color. Organizations receive \$10,000 in unrestricted funding for two years, \$5,000 to work with a consultant in the second year, and are connected to subject matter experts and each other. Organizations also have the opportunity to be a paid mentor to an incoming Thrive organization in their third year. 2020 Thrive recipients All People Arts, Maroon Arts Group and State of the Arts Productions continued their participation in the program and received \$15,000 each in their second year.

BIG IDEAS

The Big Ideas program was launched in late 2019 with the goal of uplifting artist ideas and projects that bring all art forms out into the community. A total of 22 Big Ideas grants were awarded in 2021.

ALL PEOPLE ARTS

THE WHOLE PICTURE PROJECT

Artist Kirsta Benedetti designed a communityengagement project to empower new American women to tell their stories. The project was conducted in conjunction with researchers to create an interview process that gathered stories focused on cultural and identity creation and personal resilience. Using audio, video and photographs, The Whole Picture Project harnessed the unique power of storytelling and portraiture to bring honor to each new American profiled and build connections between people of different cultures.

EDUCATION FOUNDATION FOR FREEDOM, WOMEN&GIRLS' FEST

AMINAH BRENDA LYNN ROBINSON FELLOWSHIP AND RESIDENCY

In 2021, the Arts Council and the Columbus Museum of Art (CMA) presented the secondand third-annual awards for the Aminah Robinson Fellowship programs, one of two programs created to support African-American, professional visual artists and honor the legacy of the beloved Columbus artist and MacArthur Fellow. Columbus artists Wendy Kendrick and Richard "Duarte" Brown were the 2021 and 2022 (announced in December 2021) Fellowship recipients respectively. The first residency participant, Johnathan Payne, was in Columbus June-August, 2021 living and working in Aminah Robinson's home and studio. In addition to artmaking Payne, who describes himself as a "southern, African-American queer" artist, participated in several community events, and his work was presented in Columbus College of Art & Design's Beeler Gallery in August.

In October, Aminah's house was put on Ohio's registry of Historic Places and a marker was installed out front, signaling to the world the importance of Aminah, her life and her home to Columbus and the Shepard neighborhood.

CAPACITY BUILDING

workshops and one board introduction event with a total of 386 participants.

The Arts Council helps with capacity building for arts organizations and artists by personal, group and one-on-one assistance, making connections between organizations and artists to Arts Council networks, and by sharing best practices and resources.

In 2021, the Arts Council conducted 22 workshops and one board introduction event with a total of 386 participants.

Workshop topics included project support workshops, the federal Shuttered Venue grant program, taxes for artists, accounting/insurance to manage risk, crisis communications, art accessibility for people with disabilities led by Art Possible Ohio and LGBTQIA: Pronouns & Allyship lead by Equitas.

In October, the Arts Council invited organizational grantees and members of young professional, leadership, affinity and cultural heritage groups to participate in a virtual event. Twenty organizations and 52 individuals signed up for the opportunity to meet and explore possible engagement. Over the past two years, this event has helped to place a total of 20 new members on arts boards and committees, enabling more diverse representation for those organizations.

RAYMOND J. HANLEY AWARD

Dancer, choreographer and BalletMet Artistic
Director Edwaard Liang was selected as the 13th
recipient of the Raymond J. Hanley Award. The
annual award from the Raymond J. Hanley Fund at
The Columbus Foundation is given to an artist who
has demonstrated a high level of achievement
while working at least five years in the arts in any
discipline. The award money of \$15,000 is given
without restriction, so that the artist can use it to
further their career as needed.

A former dancer with New York City Ballet and Nederlands Dans Theater, Liang joined BalletMet in 2013 and has built an international reputation as a choreographer. Over the last decade, he has created work for the Bolshoi Ballet, Houston Ballet, Joffrey Ballet, Kirov Ballet, New York City Ballet, Pacific Northwest Ballet, San Francisco Ballet, Shanghai Ballet, Singapore Dance Theatre and Washington Ballet.

ARTISTS ELEVATED

In November the Arts Council announced the inaugural recipients of the Artists Elevated awards, a \$20,000 cash award focused on providing substantial funds to Columbus-based artists who have been working professionally for at least three years. The awards are intended to provide a more meaningful investment in moving an artist forward in their career.

The two inaugural recipients are Erika Tay Lane, a theater director, writer, actor and mentor and Quianna Simpson a dancer and choreographer with more than 30 years' experience studying traditional West African dance, music and culture. Simpson's award was underwritten by Bath & Body Works.

The Artists Elevated awards are supported by the Arts Council's endowment, the GCAC Community Fund, at The Columbus Foundation. In the fall the Arts Council announced a gift of \$1 million from the American Electric Power Foundation to the community endowment fund, which supports the awards.



As may be expected, Arts Council grantees' revenues fell dramatically during the pandemic's resulting closures and restricted ticketing and admissions. Despite those strained circumstances they continued to serve the central Ohio community, and managed to increase contributed revenue despite intense competition for donations. Operating Support organizations continued to connect school children to quality arts education experiences through long-standing partnerships.

ART COLUMBUS MAKES MAKES COLUMBUS ART

The Art Makes Columbus campaign depends on tremendous generosity from our media and community partners and throughout the pandemic their support has been critical to the vibrancy and visibility of the campaign. Dedicated marketing partnerships resulted in 52 interviews on CD92.9, 22 interviews on WSNY, 26 CityPulse articles and 26 Columbus Underground articles all featuring Columbus-based artists and organizations. In 2021 media partners contributed a total of \$369,722 in-kind support to the Art Makes Columbus campaign.



In the fall, the Arts Council leveraged the Columbus Makes Art campaign to help organizations get people back in the door by launching the Columbus Makes Art Passport. During September and October, 10,000 printed passports were distributed to encourage people to visit and engage with 59 cultural organizations. People enjoyed this in-real-life opportunity to experience the arts, many citing that they discovered new organizations and experiences in the process. Passports were validated at participating locations with stickers featuring work by 23 Columbus-based artists, and validations earned participants prizes. Prizes included signed prints purchased from artists, tickets to events, restaurant gift cards and many other fun incentives. The program drew participants from more than 40 zip codes in Ohio. The 2022 Art Makes Columbus Passport is planned for September and October.

Since 2014 the Arts Council has provided matching funds to six community partners to pay artists to perform and add vibrancy to the city's markets and outdoor public spaces. Partners include: Capital Crossroads' Pearl Market, Columbus Commons, Gay Street Sunlight and Moonlight Markets; Greater Columbus Convention Center; John Glenn International Airport; North Market; Short North Arts District. Despite continued periods of shut downs and restrictions, the program continued this year.




ARTWALKS COLUMBUS


#ARTUNITESCBUS EXHIBITIONS

Six additional exhibitions of the mural boards created during the protests of 2020 were installed in the fall of 2021 in partnership with educational institutions including Capital University, Columbus College of Art & Design, Columbus Metropolitan Library, Denison University, Ft. Hayes Metropolitan Education Center and The Ohio State University. The exhibitions helped continue the ongoing dialogue needed for our community to confront systemic racism. Thanks to the generosity of donors, including the city of Columbus, American Electric Power Foundation, Engie, The Ohio State University, Huntington, Easton Community Foundation and Cardinal Health, the Arts Council will publish a book titled Art. Activism & Action. This publication will serve as a platform for both the thoughts and feelings of Columbus Black creatives around the continued fight for social equity and as a tool to keep the conversation and

DELIVER BLACK DREAMS

Developed by Marshall Shorts and led by Maroon Arts Group in partnership with the Arts Council and the city of Columbus, The multifaceted racial equity campaign, Deliver Black Dreams, continued in 2021 to use public art as a launch point for a sustained and future-oriented approach to achieving racial equity in Columbus—one that helps the community reimagine and design a city where everyone can live abundantly. Deliver Black Dreams seeks long-term change in the culture and a future where Black people and those who love them are free to choose their destiny and free from oppression.

The first phase of the campaign is based in visual expression and has employed Black artists to create public art and engaged young people and new artists. Two more murals were installed in 2021, one on Wilson Road south of Fisher in the Hilltop by artists Shelbi Harris-Roseboro and Marcus William Billingsley and another on Frebis Avenue just west of Alum Creek on the south side designed by Marshall Shorts. Both murals were created with assistance from young artists and a number of community volunteers.

With the move into a new, accessible office the Arts Council created a public gallery to focus on work by artists from historically marginalized communities. The Arts Council presented three exhibitions in 2021: #ArtUnitesCbus Film & Photography, featuring the photographs and films of the 12 recipients of the #ArtUnitesCbus Film and Photography awards; Entangled Threads, in partnership with the King Arts Complex, showcasing the work of five Columbus-based fiber artists; Necessary Habits, in partnership with Goodwill Art Studio & Gallery, featuring 18 of the artists of The Art Studio.

The Columbus Music Commission, also known as Music Columbus, is dedicated to connecting music makers, music commerce and the community to engage in creating, performing and promoting great music for Columbus and the world.

In 2021, Music Columbus introduced Earn As You Learn, a summer internship program, paying nine student interns \$15 per hour and placing them with mentors at recording studios, radio stations, retailers, app developers and the Music Commission to obtain hands-on training.

FILM COLUMBUS

Film Columbus awarded two fellowships to Columbus-based filmmakers: a \$20,000 grant for a Columbus film project to Joshua Clark and a \$2,500 award for script development to Corey Aumiller. These awards are the first large-scale awards specifically for film given by the Arts Council.

Two Columbus-based feature films were released to wide acclaim in 2021. Both films have received impressive reviews in notable publications like *The New York Times* and *Los Angeles Times*. In addition, both films used Columbus and Ohio-based musicians for the majority of their soundtracks.



Film industry professionals, brand experts, state legislators and community members met in October to help develop an economic and educational marketplace for film and related industries in fall of 2022.



Jon Sherman's film *They/Them/Us* premiered at Dances With Films in Los Angeles in September and was acquired by Gravitas Ventures for distribution. The film was released in theaters nationwide in January and is now available for purchase on all major streaming platforms.

Poser, from local production company Loose Films, was one of six films chosen for the prestigious narrative feature competition at Tribeca Film Festival.





Dresden

In 1995, the Arts Council launched an artist Exchange with Dresden, Germany, a Columbus Sister City. Each year, this program sends two Columbus artists to Dresden and hosts two German artists in Columbus, each for up to 90 days. In addition to a small stipend, Columbus artists are provided with airfare, lodging and an art studio. Columbus artists Joshua Penrose and George Rush were able to travel to Dresden in 2021 after travel restrictions stalled their 2020 plans. 
