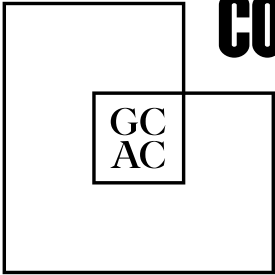

## Letter from the Board Chair and President

In 2023 the Greater Columbus Arts Council celebrated 50 years by looking ahead to the next 50. Our 50th Anniversary was an ideal time to look forward and imagine an even more vibrant and thriving arts community in Columbus.

Years of hard work securing the culture fee to raise more funds for the arts were followed by a pandemic that shook the world. Recovery has been slow, but we are finally starting to see the fruits of our culture fee initiative. In 2023 we were able to award more funding than ever, but we also uncovered challenges that required us to re-examine how we continue to be excellent stewards of public funds.

So, we began to reimagine how GCAC could best serve our community. Our Grants & Community Engagement staff hosted multiple sessions connecting with more than 500 people in the arts community to help us better structure our funding to artists. We launched work on the first comprehensive public art plan for Columbus, and we built a new website to help our grantees find the information they need faster.

Following are a few of the highlights from our investment in artists, arts organizations and our community in 2023:

- Funding to organizations increased significantly once more, thanks to increased revenues from the culture fee. We awarded \$10,559,732 to 22 Operating Support organizations, \$801,218 in General Support to 16 organizations and 63 organizations received Project Support totaling \$710,702.
- Funds for Artists (previously Support for Professional Artists) again reached historically high-levels—1,123 artists received more than \$1.8 million dollars in non-competitive grants.

- In our ongoing efforts towards more diversity, equity and inclusion, we launched a community ambassador program, GCAC Navigators, with 17 artists who received a stipend to spend the year reaching out to artists in the community. Multi-disciplinary and multi-lingual, this diverse group tackled their job of connecting their peers with GCAC resources with gusto.
- The Arts Festival welcomed a new festival director and festival coordinator, embraced the new development on the Scioto Peninsula with a Patron Party at The Junto, and expanded activities with live-painting and twice as many hands-on activities for children and families.
- We dove deeply into public art through research and investment. With support from the city of Columbus and Franklin County we launched Greater Columbus. Greater Art., an initiative to develop the first comprehensive public art plan for our community. We hired Lord Cultural Resources to guide the 14-month effort and led a five-month public engagement campaign that engaged more than 2,000 people. This work continues and the final plan will be presented in June of 2024. We also launched a new Mural Assistance grant program—with funding of \$177,500 to new murals in our community.

- We held our second Big Arts Night with a celebration of our 50th Anniversary and the 50th Anniversary of hip hop. The night included awards, music, dance, visual arts and drag at the Southern Theatre and Westin Great Southern Hotel. We celebrated \$198,000 in awards to individuals, including \$125,000 in Artists Elevated awards
- The GCAC and Film Columbus websites were completely rebuilt—focusing content and design on seamlessly providing what is needed most by those seeking funding and resources.

At GCAC we believe the arts are an essential thread in the fabric of our community, weaving together diverse voices, perspectives and experiences that make our city vibrant—culturally and economically.

As we begin 2024, GCAC strives to be a catalyst for innovation and growth in the arts every day. We are committed to fueling a more vibrant creative sector and connected community, one that will serve us into the next 50 years.

We are grateful to our major funders—the city of Columbus, Mayor Andrew Ginther and Columbus City Council, the Franklin County Commissioners, the Ohio Arts Council, The Ohio State University and all the individuals, businesses and community partners who help us build a thriving community where the arts matter to all of us.

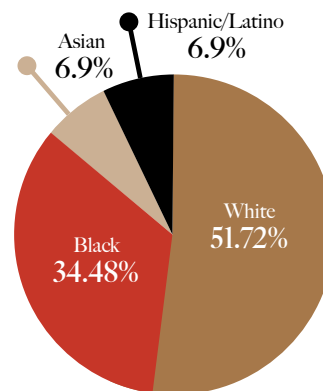

# FINANCIAL SUPPORT & RESOURCES

## Grants & Community Engagement

The Greater Columbus Arts Council's Grants & Community Engagement team served more than 1,200 artists and organizations in 2023, resulting in the second year in a row of historic levels of financial support, and continued growth in access to online resources such as workshops. In addition to increased giving in every category, new programs were added including the Mural Assistance grants and Capital Expense grants.

Following are a few highlights from 2023:

- Reimagining the future of GCAC grants to artists. The Grants and Community Engagement team spent a lot of time in 2023 listening. The multi-faceted effort included community roundtable discussions, focus groups and a public survey, connecting with more than 500 people in the arts community, mostly artists. Through a third-party facilitator, grantees provided honest input that helped guide our future planning.
- The GCAC Navigator program was launched with 18 artists selected from 71 nominations. These new community ambassadors helped 100+ artists receive a grant, with 52% of grantees who spoke to a Navigator receiving their first ever GCAC grant.
- GCAC added a staff person focused on technology, data and analytics to provide additional support to grantees through the online application process.
- The Mural Assistance grant program was launched, investing \$177,500 in 32 murals around Columbus. This program was created to support artists' work in the

community, enhance the built environment in neighborhoods and generate dialogue about public art around the city.

- The new Capital Expense grants program provided \$1,155,265 to eight organizations to support facility upgrades and improvements. The program was open to Operating and General Support grantees that own their own buildings or have a long-term lease. Recipients are determined by a panel of community experts in architecture, facility planning and construction. Capital Expense grants in 2023 supported upgrading performance and practice spaces, building new infrastructure, supplying vital storage and creating interactive installations for the public.

## Capacity Building

Fifty artists took advantage of one-on-one financial coaching with Minerva Financial. Artists were selected from previous GCAC award, fellowship, or residency winners and those who attended the Finances 101 workshop.

Provided access to YWCA's Columbus Racial Equity 101 training to grantees.

Ninety-three artists and arts administrators received free headshots.

More than 145 people attended a speed-networking event introducing nonprofit arts organizations to possible board/committee members—27 organizations signed up and 11 participants joined an organization in a volunteer leader role.

Nearly 200 people attended an Arts Happy Hour at Palmas Tropical Escape and more than 100 people joined us at our offices for a drop-in pizza party. Set in a fun and informal atmosphere, networking events help connect people to GCAC and to each other.

Twelve small and mid-sized nonprofit arts organizations participated in a pilot program that included 10 hours of accounting and bookkeeping services from two CPA firms, Wells CPA and Accounting Solutions of Ohio.

# DIVERSITY, EQUITY & INCLUSION

## GCAC Navigators

In 2023 the Greater Columbus Arts Council launched the GCAC Navigator program, a new initiative focused on engaging more deeply with the diverse Columbus community and increasing outreach to new artists, especially those from historically marginalized or underrepresented communities. Each year the Navigator program hires 12-18 artists to share resources and guide artists through GCAC grant & fellowship applications. The 2023 participants included practitioners in dance, literary, visual, theatrical, film, fashion, comics and musical arts; and artists who speak Arabic, English, French, Japanese, Portuguese, Spanish, Somali, Swahili and Urdu.

The program has six primary goals:

**AWARENESS** – introducing new artists to GCAC.

**EDUCATION** – sharing GCAC resources and opportunities available to artists.

**ACCESSIBILITY** – increasing community knowledge of artist drop-in hours, computer lab, translation/interpretation services, workshops, draft reviews, one-on-one coaching.

**CONNECTION** – building trust through meetings, attending events, asking for feedback, listening to artist needs.

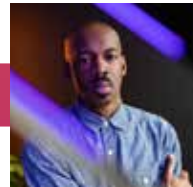
**GROWTH** – increasing the number of artists who attend workshops, apply for grants and fellowships, or connect with GCAC.

**RESPONSE** – Using artist and community feedback to help GCAC staff adapt guidelines, grant programs, workshop offerings, accessibility plans and inclusion efforts to better serve the community.

# Thrive

Grants & Community Engagement selected the final three Thrive organizations—bringing the total to 12 organizations served through this three-year engagement. An additional stipend of \$60,000 was offered to the cohorts of the first three years of the program to support staffing in the way their board and leadership deemed most effective. At the end of the three-year engagement, almost all the organizations will have received a total of \$100,000 over three years to help their groups stabilize, operationalize and grow. Heading into 2024 GCAC is looking at different ways to support Columbus' BIPOC arts organizations.

# DIVERSITY, EQUITY & INCLUSION

## Aminah Robinson Fellowship and Residencies

The Aminah Robinson Fellowship and Residency programs celebrate the legacy of Columbus artist Aminah Robinson by recognizing the exemplary work of African American artists. The programs are presented each year in partnership with the Columbus Museum of Art (CMA), who owns and manages Robinson's restored Shepard neighborhood home and studio. CMA facilitates the participating artists' experience and outreach, and fully underwrites the Writer/Scholar/Researcher Residency. GCAC manages the online application process for all three programs and underwrites the artist awards.



Columbus-based mixed media artist Beverly Whiteside was chosen for the 2023 Aminah Robinson Fellowship. Whiteside graduated with a BA in education from Bowling Green State University and an MA in education from Ohio Dominican University. She was employed as a dance education specialist at Fair Avenue Arts Impact School, where she shared her love for visual art and creative dance movement with children, and she served in Serendipity Lab's Artist in Residency program in 2020. Her work can be seen at the James Cancer Hospital's James Gallery, the new Hilton Downtown Tower, at the Dayton Art Institute and many other galleries, museums and corporate spaces.



Marla L. McLeod was selected for the 2023 Aminah Robinson Residency. McLeod explores Black identity and social constructs through her portrait paintings, textiles and sculptures. She received her BS in studio art from Southern Connecticut State University in 2014 and her MFA from The School of the Museum of Fine Arts at Tufts University in 2020. She currently teaches at Boston College, Maine College of Art & Design and Massachusetts Institute of Technology.



Allie Martin, an assistant professor in the Department of Music at Dartmouth College, was chosen as the second-annual Aminah Robinson Writing Resident. Martin is an ethnomusicologist who explores the relationships between race, sound and gentrification in Washington, DC. Utilizing a combination of ethnographic fieldwork and digital humanities methodologies, she considers how African Americans in the city experience gentrification as a sonic, racialized process. Her work has been supported by the Ford Foundation, the Smithsonian Institution, the Society for American Music and the American Musicological Society.

# Neighborhood Arts Connection

The Neighborhood Arts Connection fellowship is designed to celebrate the vibrancy and life of Columbus neighborhoods by inviting resident artists to create participatory arts experiences within the community. Recipients received grants ranging from \$5,000 to \$10,000.

Round one grantees included four Hilltop projects: a mindfulness yoga and sound therapy program with Victoria Frye, an interactive cyanotype photography day with Mat Marrash, an art exhibition and workshop series at the Highland Youth Garden by Karin Weston and an outdoor lending library and mural in partnership with ThirdWay Café organized by Luka Weinberger. A project in Clintonville included an Artcar parade, costume decorating and exhibition by Greg Phelps.

The second round of funding included projects in multiple neighborhoods—an art and music fair from Rick Borgia in Northland, the Clintonville Community Learning Project from Sam Corlett, a jazz and arts concert from Mark Hampton on the Far East Side, heartbeat drum circle on the South Side by Baba Jubal Harris, community creature workshops on the West Side with Charlotte McGraw, a series of interactive workshops focused around Olde Towne East and King-Lincoln Bronzeville with Chineze Okpalaoka, Melissa Vogley Woods’ community-designed mural on 700 Bryden also in Olde Towne East, and Julie Whitney-Scott’s project *I Was Once You & You Will Be a Better Me* in northeast Columbus.

For each highlighted neighborhood, a jury consisting of residents and community leaders selected the projects.



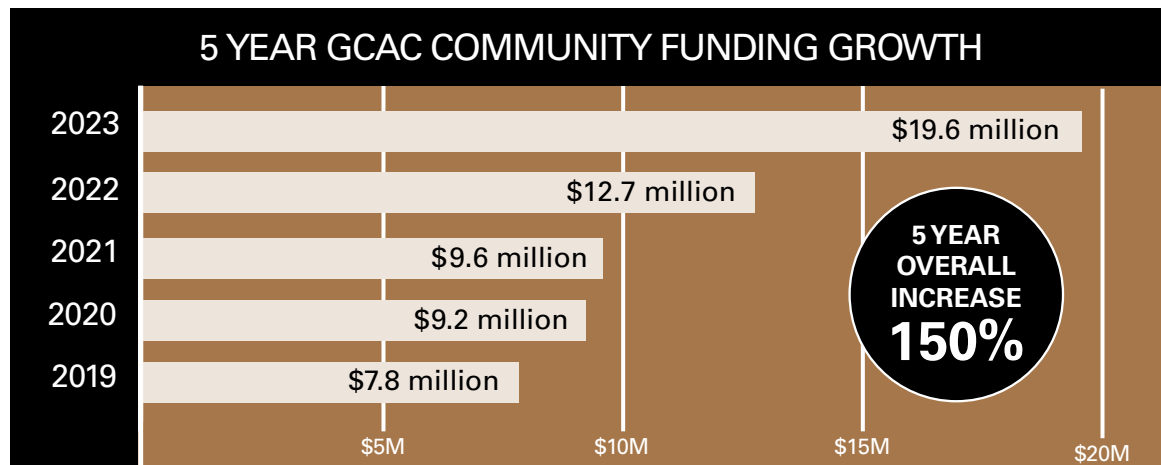

Community funding is the amount of money GCAC provides to organizations and projects in the community and includes: Grants and Community Engagement, Designated Project Support and Film Columbus expenses (see Financials on page 61 for breakdown). Community funding continued to grow during the pandemic due to proceeds from the admissions fee, CARES Act funds, funding from Franklin County and board designation of unrestricted funds.

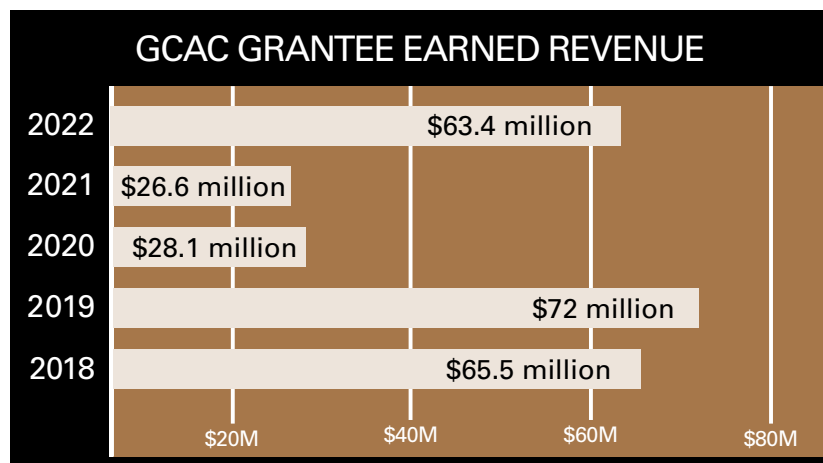

# ARTS FUNDING IN COLUMBUS—WHERE ARE WE NOW?

In late 2023 GCAC began research into the current status of arts funding in Columbus. Using the most recent research from 2012 as a benchmark, GCAC engaged Lord Cultural Resources to discover where Columbus is now in comparison to our peer cities—both in terms of the structure of arts funding and funding entities, as well as total dollars awarded to organizations. While not yet complete, this research has already provided some valuable insights.

## Impact of the pandemic

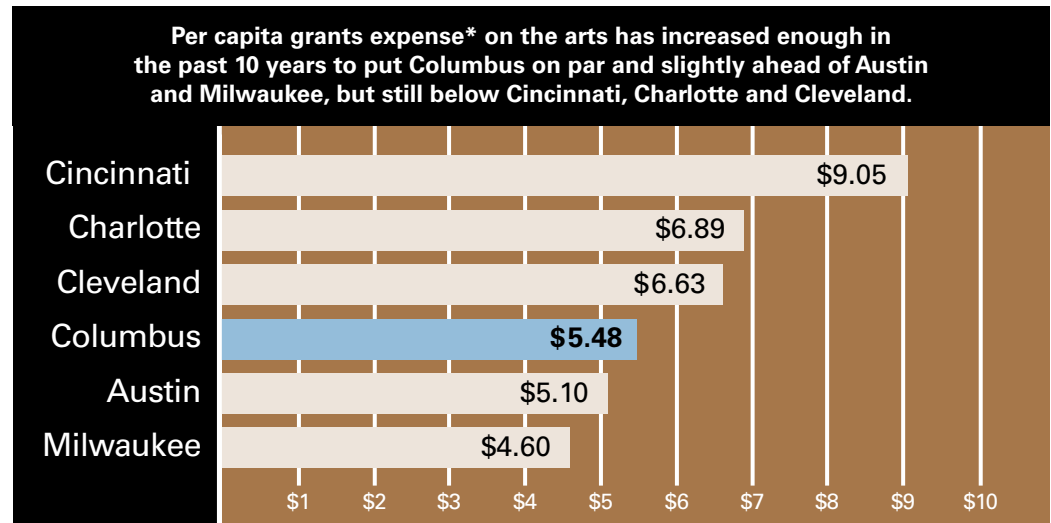
One of the biggest early takeaways is that while audiences are returning, they are not yet back to pre-pandemic levels and the nonprofit arts community in Columbus has still not fully recovered financially. Many organizations are still utilizing federal and state recovery dollars and the full impact on organizations' budgets likely will not be seen until 2025. While grants from GCAC help tremendously, most arts organizations are preparing for a future revenue crunch.

## Additional highlights

- Increased support through GCAC is helping to grow all sections of the revenue pie—including earned revenue and individual donations. This has direct benefits for Columbus-based artists—the number of artists hired has increased and the average fees artists receive when hired by funded organizations have also grown.
- Individual giving is lower in Columbus compared to other peer cities but Columbus organizations are doing a great job generating earned revenue from programs, tickets and admissions.
- In general organizations are growing revenue across all categories, including public funding and grants, the strong revenue mix helps make arts organizations more sustainable and resilient.
- The multiple sources of public funds distributed by GCAC (the city of Columbus citywide admission fee, a portion of the admission fee on events at Nationwide, a portion of the hotel-motel bed excise tax and an annual allocation

of Franklin County funds) make arts funding in Columbus more stable, enabling organizations to plan better for future programming and services.

- An additional benefit to having multiple government sources of funding managed by one organization is that arts funding in Columbus is more straightforward, streamlined and more accessible for organizations and artists. The structure of other cities funding entities requires artists and organizations to spend extra time and resources coordinating different funding sources and/or compete with their funders for philanthropy dollars.
- The above point also helps GCAC to be a leaner organization administratively than its peer funding organizations in other cities, with a smaller staff, lower overhead and a higher percentage of funds going out into the community in the form of grants.



## Art Makes Columbus

### GCAC refreshes citywide marketing campaign

In the wake of the launch of the new GCAC brand and on the cusp of the eighth anniversary of the Art Makes Columbus/ Columbus Makes Art citywide marketing campaign, GCAC's marketing team reimagined the next phase of Art Makes Columbus. Through extensive research a new direction for the campaign came to light, one that focuses on helping the Columbus community find their art.

While the bulk of the new direction will be developed in 2024, 2023 saw a refresh in the look of [ColumbusMakesArt.com](https://ColumbusMakesArt.com) and a user experience review of the arts calendar, which is the primary resource for connecting consumers with arts experiences. The user experience improvements will be completed in early 2024.

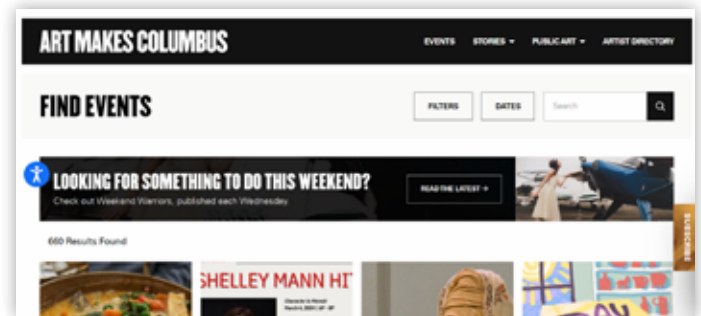

### New public art tours and search tools added

As GCAC's public art database continues to grow, the Marketing, Communications & Events staff developed six new self-guided public art tours—including neighborhood tours for Franklinton, Hilltop, North & South Discovery District, Short North and Clintonville. GCAC also commissioned Columbus-based muralist Adam Hernandez to develop new public art tours with Instagram videos to promote them. The first tour from this initiative went live in November 2023. In addition, Art Makes Columbus ads focused on driving consumers to the public art database, particularly showcasing new murals that came about through the Mural Assistance grants.

## Marketing Grants to New Artists

With the goal of extending audience reach and attracting new applicants the marketing team reallocated human and financial resources to develop a robust social media marketing plan that increased the number of posts (including more storytelling on the impact of grants on artists) and used ad dollars to increase the reach of posts announcing grant applications, deadlines and workshops. The effort was deployed in tandem with GCAC's new Navigator program.

The result was a significant increase in reach and engagement online. Shares of posts saw more than a 700% increase.

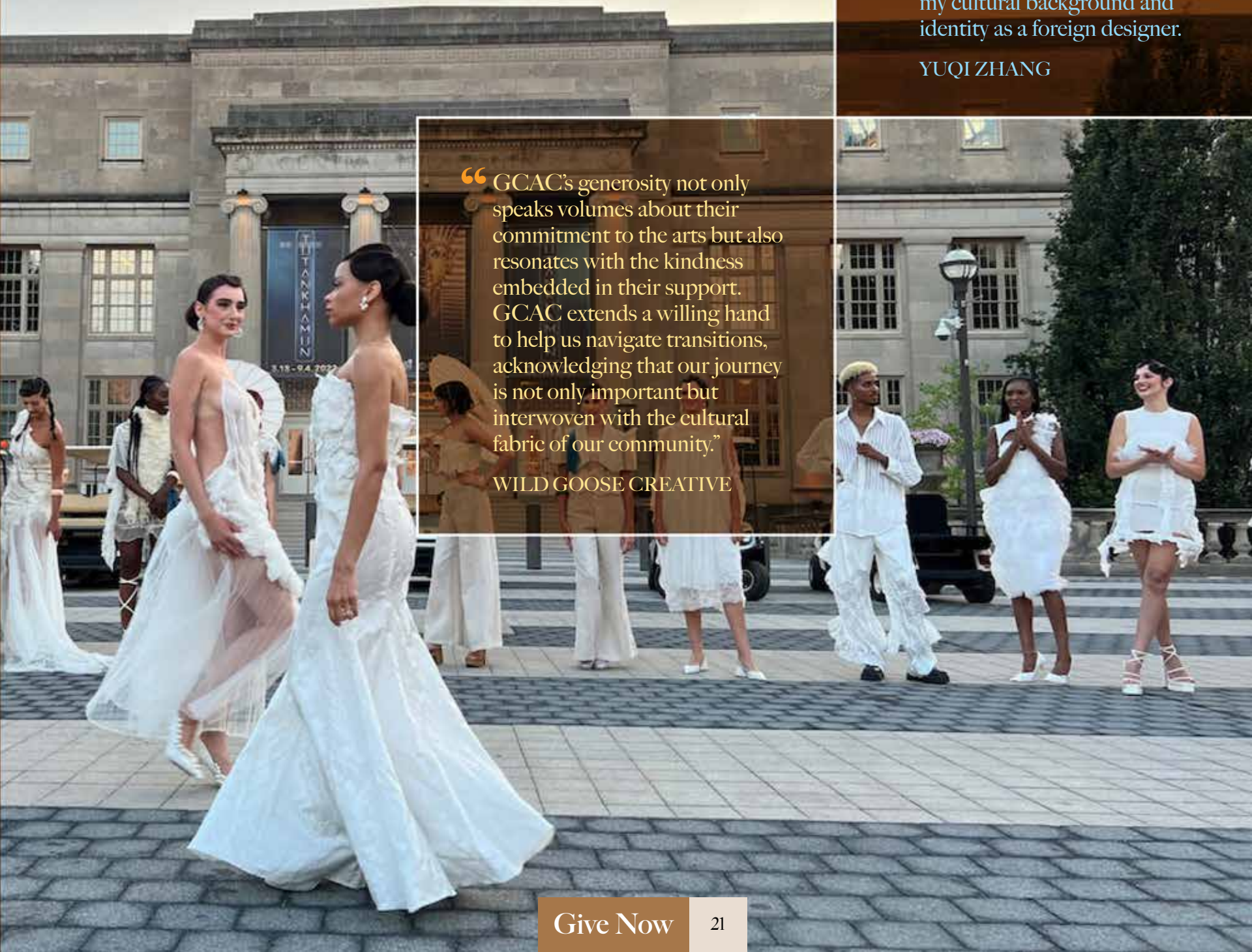

There was much to celebrate at the 61st annual Columbus Arts Festival powered by American Electric Power Foundation. The Columbus community came out in droves to purchase artwork, see live performances and enjoy all that the Columbus Arts Festival has to offer including 225 national artists, 60 Columbus-based artists in the Big Local Arts Village, three stages of music, dance, theater and spoken word along with plenty of food and drinks.

New programming and features in 2023 included:

- A Friday night fashion show featuring Columbus-based designers and models.
- Scribble, a pop-up arts event sponsored by Deloitte, brought live painting demonstrations to the Festival. Audiences watched new works of art go from a blank 4' x 4' piece of plywood to a work of art over the weekend.
- All drink vendors were Ohio-based, truly showcasing to a massive audience what local beverage brands can offer.
- The Kids Hands-On Activities Village sponsored by Battelle doubled in size over previous years. This area provided more than 20 free and engaging activities and performances for kids and families. The highlight of the Village is always the Children's Gallery that allows children under 12 the ability to choose their own art pieces and in 2023 a Teen Gallery was introduced to allow ages 12-17 to grow their collections as well.

# BIG ARTS NIGHT

## Community Arts Partnership Awards

In 2023 GCAC celebrated the Second Big Arts Night at the Southern Theatre and Westin Great Southern Hotel—combining the Community Arts Partnership Awards, the Public Forum and Artists Elevated Awards for one big night of awards and art. GCAC recognized \$198,000 in awards with recipients and nearly 900 guests at an event emceed by Angela Pace and followed by a multi-disciplinary party featuring seven interactive arts experiences and a celebration of drag and the 50th Anniversary of Hip-Hop.

### Community Arts Partnership award winners included:

**Arts Educator Award:** Jim Arter, received *A Vision of Joy... Hope* by Queen Brooks and \$5,000. In future years the award will be named the Jim Arter Arts Educator Award.

**Michael B. Coleman Arts Partner Award:** Jeff Edwards, nominated by Stephen Wittmann, received *A Journeys Wandering in Harmony* by Melissa Vogley Woods.

**The winners of the 2023 Columbus Makes Art Excellence Awards** were Converging Arts Columbus, *The Journey: Civil Rights*, in the budget under \$1 million category and Short North Stage, *Slave Play* in the budget over \$1 million category. Each organization received \$15,000.

**In its fourth year, the Dale E. Heydlauff Community Arts Innovation Awards honored** the creative and innovative ways in which our community addressed issues of social justice and equity. Each award came with a \$5,000 cash prize, \$2,500 from GCAC and a match of \$2,500 from the award namesake Dale E. Heydlauff. Recipients were the Harmony Project's *Prisoners Program* and Steve Harrison's *Franklin the People's Park* at Franklin Park Conservatory & Botanical Gardens.

## Raymond J. Hanley Award

Poet Maggie Smith, known for her collections of poetry, recent memoir *You Could Make This Place Beautiful* and viral hit *Good Bones* was the 15th recipient of the Raymond J. Hanley Award. The annual \$15,000 award from GCAC's Raymond J. Hanley Fund at The Columbus Foundation is given to an artist who has demonstrated a high level of achievement while working at least five years in the arts in Columbus in any discipline. The award is given without restriction, so that the artist can use it to further their career as needed. The winner is selected by a committee of the GCAC board of trustees.

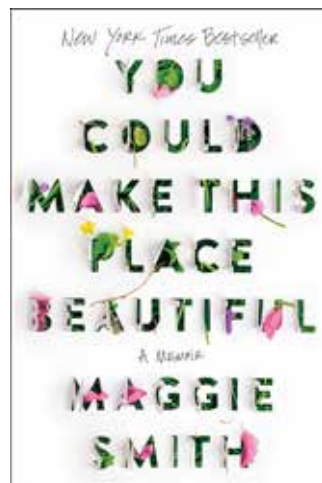
Born in Columbus in 1977, Maggie Smith holds a BA from Ohio Wesleyan University and an MFA from The Ohio State University. She is the author of seven books of poetry and prose, including *Lamp of the Body*, *The Well Speaks of Its Own Poison*, *Good Bones*, *Goldenrod*, and *Keep Moving: Notes on Loss, Creativity, and Change*. Her memoir *You Could Make This Place Beautiful*, released in April 2023, was an instant *New York Times* bestseller. Her next book,

*My Thoughts Have Wings*, an illustrated picture book for children, was published in February 2024. Smith's poems and essays have appeared in the *New York Times*, *The New Yorker*, *The Paris Review*, *The Guardian*, *TIME*, *The Nation*, *The Atlantic* and *The Best American Poetry*. A 2011 recipient of a Creative Writing Fellowship from the National Endowment for the Arts, Smith has also received multiple Individual Excellence Awards from the Ohio Arts Council.

## Artists Elevated

The 2023 Big Arts Night also celebrated five recipients of GCAC's Artists Elevated Awards—Jenny Deller, Noah Dixon, Marcus Jackson, Joan Madison and Ricarrdo Valentine. Each artist received an unrestricted award in the amount of \$25,000. The awards are focused on providing substantial funds to Columbus-based artists who have been working professionally for at least three years, and are intended to provide a meaningful investment in moving an artist forward in their career.



**Jenny Deller** (she/her) is a screenwriter and director whose award-winning debut feature film, *Future Weather*, stars Amy Madigan, Lili Taylor, Marin Ireland and Perla Haney-Jardine. Trained as an actor in New York and San Francisco, Deller has performed in classical plays, a one-woman show, experimental theater and on *Law &*

*Order*, and produced the Athens, Ohio thriller *Claire in Motion*. She has been selected for numerous film programs with Film Independent and The Gotham Film & Media Institute. Her projects have been supported by Tribeca Film Institute, Netflix, Women in Film, The Nantucket Screenwriters Colony and the Wexner Center.



**Noah Dixon** (he/him) is a screenwriter, director and co-owner of the Columbus-based production company, Loose Films. Dixon's first feature film, *Poser*, was selected for the 2020 Gotham Narrative Lab and had its world premiere at the 2021 Tribeca Film Festival. Dixon's films and music videos have screened at festivals around the world and have

been featured in *Rolling Stone*, *Variety*, *IndieWire* and *MTV's Total Request Live*. Dixon was recently a recipient of the 2023 Artist Exchange in Dresden, Germany sponsored by GCAC.

**Marcus Jackson** (he/him) is a poet and photographer who studied in New York University's graduate creative writing program and as a Cave Canem fellow. His poems and photographs have appeared in *The American Poetry Review*, *The New Yorker* and *The New York Times Magazine*. His second book of poems, entitled *Pardon My Heart*,

was released in 2018. Of *Pardon My Heart*, Jeff Gordinier for *The New York Times* writes, "Jackson's collection confirms the arrival of a thrilling new voice in American poetry, one whose writing, on page after page, has the fullness and glow of a jubilee."



Originally from Queens, New York, **Joan Madison** (she/her) has amassed more than 20 years of experience in the fashion industry. After studying fashion design at FIT and Syracuse University, Madison embarked on her professional career designing garments for Ellen Tracy, Liz Claiborne and Ann Taylor before

relocating to Columbus to work at Express. Her custom couture gowns have graced the runways of Fashion Week Columbus, Lexus Charleston Fashion Week, New York Fashion Week and London Fashion Week. Madison's Artists Elevated Award was made possible by Nick and Donna Akins.



**Ricardo Valentine** (he/him) is a second-generation Black, Jamaican American/estadounidense, same gender-loving interdisciplinary artist and certified Ohio master farmer, who finds value in collaboration and community. With Orlando Hunter-Valentine he co-founded Brother(hood) Dance!, an interdisciplinary duo that seeks

to inform its audiences on socio-political and environmental injustices from a global perspective. Valentine is a third-year MFA candidate in dance, integrating agriculture and technology at OSU, and a 2020 Bessies Honoree of the NY Dance and Performance Awards.

# PUBLIC ART

## Planning for the Future

In June 2023 GCAC launched “Greater COLUMBUS. Greater ART.” a year-long initiative to create a roadmap for the future of public art in the central Ohio region. With funding from the city of Columbus, Franklin County and GCAC, it will be the first comprehensive public art plan for the city and county.

The plan is being produced with support from professional consultancy Lord Cultural Resources and Columbus-based cultural practitioners Jonna Twigg and Marshall Shorts. A Steering Committee composed of representatives from local stakeholder groups is lending additional oversight and input. The final Columbus & Franklin County Public Art Plan will be released in June 2024.

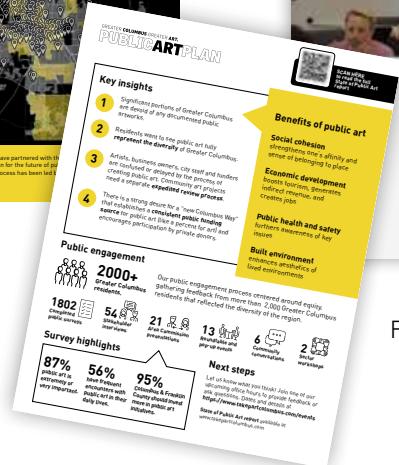

### BENEFITS OF PUBLIC ART

**Social cohesion** strengthens one’s affinity and sense of belonging to place

**Economic development** boosts tourism, generates indirect revenue, and creates jobs

**Navigating Process:** Artists, business owners, city staff and funders all identified confusion and/or delays with the current process for developing public art.

**Call for Consistent Funding:** There is a strong desire for a “New Columbus Way” that establishes a consistent public funding source for public art and encourages participation by private donors.

Film Columbus is a division of GCAC and aims to grow the film industry in Columbus and central Ohio by creating jobs and building Columbus as a top city for film education, exhibition and production. The Columbus Music Commission is supported by GCAC with funds from the city of Columbus, in addition to support from individuals and businesses.

2023 marked a year of dynamic progress and groundbreaking achievements for Film Columbus, a division of GCAC. In the midst of industry-wide challenges, including the WGA writer's strike and SAG-AFTRA actor's strike, Film Columbus led programs, networking events, and workshops that strategically focused on supporting Columbus-based filmmakers and crew, helping them refine their skills and advance their projects.

Critical investments and accomplishments:

- Invested more than \$100,000 in Columbus-based filmmakers. This included the Pitch Cbus 23 Competition in partnership with Film Columbus, Gateway Film Center, and Cinema Columbus Film Festival, the Artists Elevated Awards, and GCAC grants. More than \$225,000 in GCAC grant funds have been set aside for Columbus-based filmmaker funding in 2024.
- Advocated successfully for expanding the Ohio Motion Picture Tax Credit to \$75 million, collaborating with other state film commissions. The OMPTC rose to \$50 million from July 1, 2023, and will increase to \$75 million on July 1, 2024. Film Columbus also played a pivotal role in advocating for Senate Bill 4, introduced by Senator Kirk Schuring, which proposes an uncapped tax incentive to boost the local film industry. Advocacy will continue on this effort.
- The Film Columbus Pitch Cbus Contest in October 2023 welcomed diverse film genres and provided funding to filmmakers Sydnee Roberts-Crews, Julia Applegate, Drew Johnson, Monserrat Tlahuel Flores, Trey Small, Jon Osbeck, Otis Winston, Eli Hiller, Cyrus Littlejohn-Richardson, and Tyrone Russel.
- Six workshops were held on topics including budgeting, legal issues, production assistants, pitching and acting. These workshops, primarily free, provided important information access for aspiring filmmakers.
- The 2023 Film Summit and mini job fair, held in April, featured panelists from across Ohio and presented networking and employment opportunities, including resume collection by Good Deed Entertainment.
- Released the first Ohio Film Studio Feasibility Study in partnership with SHM Partners. This study identified potential sites in Columbus for the state's premier tier-one film studio and soundstage.



**FilmColumbus.com** was rebuilt and launched in October. The site offers an enhanced user experience, improving access to events, workshops, and filmmaking and grant resources.

# MUSIC COLUMBUS

The Columbus Music Commission's mission is to nurture a community where people can prosper in the business of music while contributing to Columbus' overall cultural and economic growth. The Commission received a \$200,000 grant from GCAC in 2023 to encourage growth in the music industry in Columbus.

Programming highlights include:

- The Better Together Music Incubator facilitated six months of ongoing artistic and entrepreneurial development, including training in communications and marketing, finances, contracts, sync licensing, royalties, songwriting, performance and vocals. The program served nine bands and 25 individual artists and culminated in a final showcase at Café Bourbon Street and The Summit Music Hall in October.
- This inaugural Hilltop Spring Jamboree event celebrated community, music, and arts in the westside community. It was produced in collaboration with Hilltop Arts Collective and We Amplify Voices and provided paid performance opportunities to five bands and 20 individual artists.
- Music Columbus spearheaded the Greater Columbus Music Census in collaboration with Sound Music Cities, a leading Austin-based provider of music ecosystem studies and music census work, as part of their multi-city music census cohort. More than 1,500 central Ohio musicians participated in the community-led initiative to gain a better understanding of the current needs of the music community in central Ohio.
- Gift of Music instrument drive collected more than 320 instruments and accessories and distributed them to 18 area organizations. The program received donations totaling \$406,000.
- The Unheard emerging artist program showcased 29 artists at three events and the Earn As You Learn internship program engaged 13 aspiring music workers who were mentored by industry leaders over the course of eight weeks during Summer 2023.

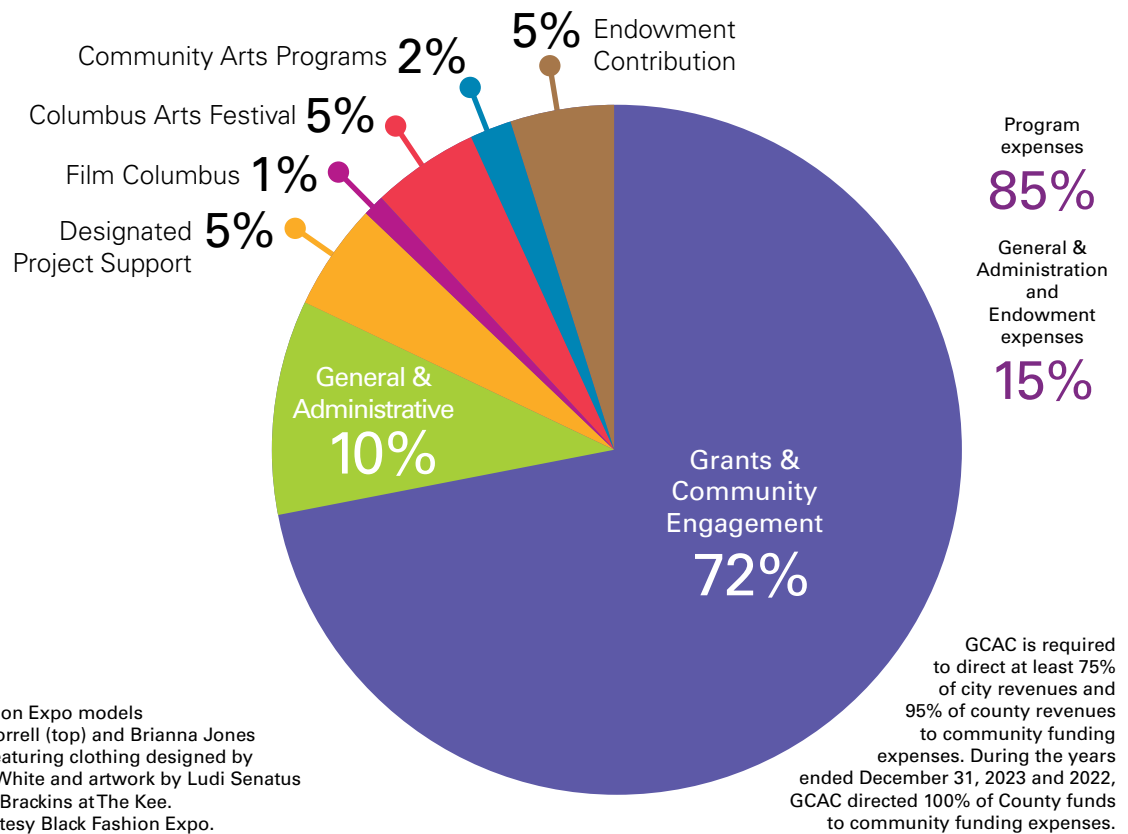
